

## Premier 2006 "Our Dogs Do Stuff"

The year long competition comes down to this one day. The top ten dogs of each breed are showcased in front of their respective judges with hopes of making it to the next day for the final judging of The Top Ten. All of the conditioning, all of the grooming, all of the hard work of the last year comes down to these two days of stiff competition. Once the top dog from each breed is chosen, they go on to compete in the semi-final round. If they are chosen from this group, they show again the next evening, competing for the title of UKC's number one dog in the country.

Even though there is a lot of pressure surrounding the rings on top ten day, the rest of the weekend is packed full of other events. Handlers and their dogs travel from all over the country for this weekend of confirmation, obedience, showmanship, agility, weight pull, top ten, total dog, family dog sport, and terrier races. Anywhere you go within the fairgrounds, there is something going on. Between our shows, you could spend time watching other rings, shopping at all the vendors, or relaxing with friends. This is a great environment to learn about new opportunities for you and your dogs to work towards for the next year.

Confirmation, top ten, obedience, and showmanship are the regular events that most shows have. Agility has grown to be a very big competition on this weekend as well. Many people make the trek to Kalamazoo just to compete in these trials. They now have indoor and outdoor arenas that they keep busy running the multiple dogs in all day long. Terrier races and weight pull are growing every year. Weight pull is very interesting to watch and a fun sport to get involved in if your dogs have the drive for it. Family dog sport has always drawn a lot of attention with all of the yelling that goes on in this area. It is a demonstration of protection work among different breeds. The people that instruct this are very informative about what they are looking for and how they can usually get it out of the dogs. It is a very interesting ring to be around for small and large breeds and even if it's just for a little while. Total dog takes place on Saturday and is a very prestigious title to earn. To be recognized as a total dog, that dog must take a placement in the confirmation ring as well as qualifying in another sport event such as obedience, agility, or weight pull. UKC takes a lot of pride in this competition and it really lets the all-star dogs of that day shine.

## The Piroha's - Dottie, Pete, Ajax & Zeus

Pete and I live just outside of Albany, NY. Pete is a building contractor doing industrial maintenance for UPS and residential remodeling. I do contract administration work for a subcontractor to the NYS & federal governments.

We both grew up with dogs all of our lives so there was no question that we would have dogs in our lives after we got married in 1986. There was, however, a compromise. Pete won the breed choice (GSD) and I won on allowing them to be house dogs instead of keeping them in a kennel. We have never regretted the compromise. Pete loves the incredible bond that we've had with all of our dogs and I'm sold on GSDs.

Our first 3 GSDs (Zoltan, Gundi & Vader) were traditional black & tans and our 4th (Zane) was all black. They have all gone to the rainbow bridge now and we miss them dearly. When it came time to adopt our 5th GSD, Pete insisted on a great white because they were so unusual and beautiful. We did a lot of research before finally making the decision to go with WSs because of some negative feedback we got from people who had or knew WSs, even our vet (who we have since won over). There is a lot of excellent information available on the breed and we made an educated decision to go ahead with adopting a WS. We decided to adopt our first WS from Rolling H Farm in TN partly because they put pictures of the available puppies on their website, each one numbered so we could call and say which puppy we wanted. After a wonderful conversation with Faye, we adopted Ajax in 2001.

When Ajax arrived by plane from TN, he was such a sweet, gentle little man, even at 9 weeks old. He instantly bonded with Vader and adopted Vader's passion for playing ball, instituting "mandatory mommy play time". Every day (3:45 AM Monday – Friday and a bit later on weekends), regardless of weather, we have to play ball. We started him in obedience training and he passed his CGC on the first try. He was a bit bored with obedience so when he was about 1.5 years old, we started agility training. It seemed like it would be a perfect activity for him since he loves to run and we hoped that it would help build his confidence. He was so slow and disinterested in class I never thought he'd do well enough to enter trials, but I began to notice that the more spectators there were the better he performed - he's such a ham. He gets excited, happy and picks up his speed a bit (but we still have to work on increasing his speed). We just started competing in trials in June 2005. In only 3 CPE trials in 2005, he's earned all (4) of his level 1 titles and is well on his way to getting some of his level 2 titles. In USDAA, we competed in 2 trials in 2005 where we're working on his Performance 1 titles. We just joined DOCNA so we can compete in those trials as well. Many people have remarked about how elegant, graceful, powerful, precise and attentive he is. In spite of how well he's doing, and how proud he is of himself when he has a great run, he'd still rather be in his own yard playing ball. He is incredibly intelligent and is a very beautiful, sleek, muscular 82 pounds, measuring 25.5" at the withers.

In early 2004 we needed to add to our family again. It was an easy decision to stay with WSs and Rolling H just happened to have a litter that would be available shortly. This time, we decided to drive to Tennessee to pick up Zeus to avoid the stress of flying to both him and me (I was a basket case the day Ajax flew). We were very impressed with the new farm that Faye and Glenn had just moved to and the plans they have for the future. On the 20 hour drive home, Zeus and I cuddled and played all the way in the back of our Expedition. In those hours, I realized what an independent, bold, nippy genius we had and he's still the same, 2 years later, just lots bigger. He's the smartest dog we've ever met, which is usually a good thing, forcing us to be more aware of our actions, making us better parents/trainers. He's so happy and silly, loves to cuddle and to be the center of attention. He has no problem going off and exploring on his own and prefers to do that when Ajax and I are playing ball. We put him in obedience classes and he earned his CGC on the second attempt, which wouldn't have happened if the tester had seen him give lip to a stranger. We had our hands full with this dominant little guy so decided Schutzhund would be beneficial for him and us. It has helped a lot but we have a long way to go. He knows exactly what to do but gets bored easily so we constantly have to come up with new ways to challenge him. People are amazed at how attentive and happy he is when we're doing obedience and how ferocious he is in protection (he's so happy when he intimidates the helpers). Our trainer said he has the ability to be a search and rescue dog, he prefers to track animals instead of the track I put down. I started him in agility last summer because he tends to be a couch potato and needs the exercise. He can keep up with Ajax for short distances but prefers to lie down whenever he

can. He hasn't taken to agility as hoped but he has the natural ability so I'm going to keep trying. We don't have an official measurement on him yet but at 2 years old he's about 29" at the withers and he weighs in at 110 lbs, earning him the nickname "Zeus the moose". He's so long and jumps so high that he left a paw print over our back door.


Ajax and Zeus are best buddies and make a great team. They have each caught and happily devoured several full-grown rabbits – something our other GSDs were never able to do. Zeus prefers the 4 lb. pot roast from the counter however as it's much less work than rabbits. Both boys require attention, exercise and intellectual stimulation which we are happy to give them, even though we sometimes long for the days of our maintenance-free black & tans. Our lives revolve around these wonderful dogs and both Pete and I have become better doggy parents, thanks to their love and training.



## Why Herding

The other day someone asked me "Why do you do herding." That got me thinking "why in the world would I go out in the pouring rain, freezing weather or 90 degree plus days and herd sheep"? I guess the best way to tell my story is to start from the beginning.

In 1996 I went to the White Shepherd Club of Canada (WSCC) National show. This was my first experience at a dog show. I basically went to watch the show and try Star in herding. I was pretty amazed when she passed and received her HIC with ducks. At this time herding wasn't something I was interested in. I was focused on obedience and agility with her.

Four years later I got Luna. Well, Luna took me down a whole different path than Star. Star loved obedience and Luna hated it. Obedience was just too slow for Luna she wanted to move. I tried Luna in herding and she received her HIC with ducks. Then a year later I took her to a herding instructor about ½ hour from our house. I couldn't believe here my little girl was herding sheep that were bigger then she was. One of the sheep broke off and Luna went right after him and brought him back. I was standing there with my mouth open – what a rush!! But I still wasn't that interested in it.

At the 2003 American White Shepherd Association (AWSA) National show Judy Huston held an American Herding Breed Association (AHBA) testing. Luna earned her first leg toward her Herding Capability Title (HCT). Then at the 2004 AWSA another AHBA trial was held and Luna received her second leg and got her HCT. I still wasn't that interested in herding. Yes it was great seeing what Luna could do and I did take her back for some classes but I just couldn't get into it.

Then in 2005 I decided to try it again. I was working a lot of hours and needed some stress relief. I wanted something that I enjoyed doing and it had to include either both of the girls or one of them. Still wasn't sure I wanted to do herding but I knew Luna did and Star was more interested in chasing the sheep than keeping them together. I called Judi Bingham who lives in Nova, OH and asked her if she was taking on any new students. At that time she wasn't but gave me the name of another instructor – Kelly Malone.

I called Kelly and told her about my past experience (which wasn't much) with Luna. So I made our first appointment to have Kelly evaluate Luna. I like the fact that Kelly spends a full hour with you and your dog and no one else is around. I also like the fact that Kelly owns GSD's so she understands the upright, loose eyed dogs – which are what our dogs are.

Sunday morning Luna, Star and I were up and on the road to make our 3-hour trip to Nova, OH. Before I even walked into the ring Kelly was explaining everything to me. Why your dog needs to sit before you enter the ring. Why your dog doesn't charge ahead of you when entering. Then once in the ring it was no different. It wasn't just going in the ring and going around in circles. She explained everything!

Even though Luna had done some herding she never learned control. We placed Luna on a long line, which was easier for me to control her. She had to learn not to charge the sheep (go up the middle), she needed to learn control and she also needed to learn that the sheep were my toys not hers and she couldn't play with them until I told her she could.

After our first lesson I went away with a new look on herding. So the next week off we went again. Our second lesson was much better then the first one. Once the lesson was over Kelly said, "For your second week you're doing much better than last week. You have come a long way in just a week. You have a really nice dog and the two of you will make a great herding team." Boy if that didn't bring a big smile to my face.

The next lesson Kelly tried working with Luna. She said, "Well let's see if you're a real shepherd." After she said it she looked at me and said, "I didn't mean just because she was white. Most shepherds won't work for anyone else." I laughed and told her I understood what she meant. Well Luna wouldn't work for Kelly and Kelly said, "yep she's a shepherd alright just wants to work for mom." We both laughed.

In the spring Kelly mentioned going to a Cappy Pruett clinic in Michigan. It was about an hour from my house. I had already enrolled in the clinic and didn't realize until then that Kelly had trained under Cappy.

I didn't know what to expect and figured Luna and I would be so out of place. Everyone made us feel so welcome and Cappy was great. Most clinics' you have half day lecture then the rest of the day I figured Cappy would work with us. It wasn't like that at all. It was all work. I thought how am I going to learn anything by sitting here and watching everyone else. Late morning it started raining and Luna and I hadn't been in yet. Once the rain stopped Luna and I got to go in and work with Cappy. You can imagine what everyone was saying about the white dog turning color. It was so muddy but Luna wanted to work and I didn't really mind it either. We were there to learn and if Luna didn't mind the mud then neither did I. The funniest thing was when Cappy slipped and fell in the mud. He had a lot more mud on him then Luna did.

The following week Kelly told me to get in the ring and show her what I'd learned. I took a deep breath, walked in the ring and Luna and I started working for a good 20 minutes. Kelly told me that I learned more then I realized. I was more focused, a lot calmer and was giving Luna the space she needed or didn't need.

After one of our classes Kelly wanted us to work in the bigger field. Kelly wanted Luna to get use to a bigger field plus we would be working on her "That'll do". A That'll Do" is before you enter the ring you give this command and the dog can walk around but not work the sheep. Since Luna had never been worked in such a big field I felt more comfortable placing the long line on her. We went out to the backfield, which had about 5-6 sheep in it. I gave Luna her command and we walked through the gate. Kelly, Luna & I started walking the field. Two fields over there was a whole flock of sheep and I noticed they were moving. Kelly told me to give Luna her "That'll Do" command again so I did. I



couldn't figure out why because I thought Luna was doing pretty good ignoring the sheep and only looking at them once in awhile. Kelly asked me if I noticed the sheep moving over in the trail field and I told her yes. She said Luna was moving the sheep. I couldn't believe it there is no way Luna could have been moving the sheep two fields over. Kelly told me that Luna has a lot of power and a very big bubble. Just by her looking at the sheep she was moving them. I couldn't believe that she was moving sheep over in the far field – I was impressed.

In this past year I have attended more herding classes and clinics then I thought I ever would so, "Why Herding"? Why after all this time when this is something I never thought I'd ever get into why has that changed? Why every weekend do I drive 3 hours one way to herd? The best way for me to explain is it is so awesome to be in the ring, working your dog, building a stronger bond than you already have and working as one "Working as a Team." This is why Luna and I do herding.



## **Kyla's First Herding Test**

Kyla and I entered a Herding Capability Test (with sheep) yesterday. Kyla was the very last dog to run prior to the announcement of the HCT qualifiers that day so everyone came to watch her. There were even people that were leaving (non-qualifiers) that decided to watch when they heard it was White Shepherd's turn.

Admittedly, I was a little apprehensive because she was so clam watching the other dogs herd. I started thinking, "Is she not feeling well?" (In the past, when she has seen Pebbles herding in the arena, she starts barking like crazy!)

Prior to actually starting the test, you must demonstrate some control. I was asked to enter the test area, tell Kyla to Sit, walk away from her and call her to me. Once this was done, it was time to remove the leash and herd some sheep. And, that is when she came to life.

She moved effortlessly back and forth behind the stock, keeping them close to both me and the judge. (For the first leg of this test, you can ask the judge to assist you.) This enabled us to walk freely about the test area – left and then right – while Kyla kept the sheep calmly walking behind us. The primary reason for this success is that Kyla seems to instinctively understand what the subtle shepherd staff movements mean.

The judge then asked me to take the sheep to a corner and have Kyla stop (sit) about 6 feet out. I then walked to her and, without pausing, patted my leg as I headed towards the exit gate and said "Here, good girl"! She bounded along my side like the puppy that she is and had the biggest smile on her face. The judge called for "Time". Amazingly, Kyla had performed the entire test and passed in under 3 minutes!

I was instantly bombarded with questions like "How old is she?" (18 months) "Wow, she's really good, how long have you been doing this?" (We've had 2 lessons.) Above the instant wave of murmur, I heard over and over, "She's really good". It was a moment of not only being very proud of my White Shepherd but a moment of being very proud of a herding dog (that apparently has lots of potential).

#### **Introduction to Herding (and other things)**

I live in Norwalk, Ohio, which is about 30 minutes north of where Kelly Malone teaches herding. On a Saturday last fall I was filling my car with gas when I was approached be a couple of excited ladies who had seen my dog sitting in the front seat of my car. Chyna is my 5 1/2 year-old WS walking and errand-running partner. People have been known to pull over and comment on my dog when we are walking, but she was in the car. Chyna is on a kind of hiatus until she slims down some. But I continue to go to watch. In January I got a precocious little darling I call Wynnter from Mona. Kelly lets me bring her in to get familiar with the sheep, and this week she decided chasing them looked pretty fun. I think she's got the instinct too and I don't mind saying it's pretty exciting.

Everyone I have met with this group take mentoring very seriously, and I truly appreciate all their help and advice. I will continue to go and watch everyone I can because I know it will really help when Chyna and I can get in there again.



## UKC Herding Fun Days in N. Florida

The first UKC test Trial and fun day was run 1/28-29/2006 in North Florida. We had gorgeous weather Saturday and rain all day Sunday. Each obstacle was 10 points with 5 sheep it was 2 points per head on the first try 1 point per head on the second try.

Saturday we tried the Herding Capability Evaluation, Novice Herding,, and United Shepherd Excellent classes. Scarlett Sanders tried the test class with some nice young White Shepherds. Judith Kelly tried the Shepherd class. After she finished she read the rules and found she did it the hard way. After seeing Judith run we had other handlers ready try but ran out of day light.

Most of the sheep are lambing so we had to use 50 leftovers. Young rams, old eve, yearling eve, and wean lambs, not an easy group. Most of the sheep had never been worked in small group before Saturday.

The Judging was a group of three people at a time. We tried to get as many handlers as possible to try judging.

1990 was the beginning of one of the most known White Shepherd breeding in Brazil. The place is the sand dunes of Praia do Futuro, one of the most popular beaches of Fortaleza, the capital of Ceara, in the northeast of Brazil. The Dunas Brancas Kennel is the result of a great passion for herding.

A passion of three generations dedicated to German Shepherd, in 1990 it gave a turn to the white variety of the breed, and it soon became an exhibition of beauty and degree of excellence from those intrepid dogs. Presently, Nicole Novaes is our outstanding reference as a trainer and handler. Nicole was born on March 8, 1993.

Nicole is a member of SCCCPA – Sociedade Cearense de Criadores de Caes Pastores Alemaes (<a href="www.scccpa.cjb.net">www.scccpa.cjb.net</a>), the association of German Shepherd breeders from Ceara, since she was 1 year old. She has learned how to train and handle dogs with the other members of the association and they consider her their mascot. After the victorious campaign in Rio de Janeiro in 2004, some friends and trainers cried moved by their triumph in the world-wide competition.

Fox Mulder was born in 2002, and he was prepared by Nicole since he was 4 months old. This team has shown potential, and we have believed they could be very successful. In December 2002, a 10-month-old Fox Mulder and an 8-year-old Nicole were able to beat several professional handlers, becoming the best team of the breed in Brazil



In 2003 the team was more experienced, and they again were considered the best team in Brazil. In the competition, Nicole and Fox Mulder received a standing ovation, but they were penalized for handling Fox Mulder without leash during the Pan-American exhibition held in Fortaleza, Ceara.

In 2004 the team obtained excellent results. They were the team to be beaten. Because of that the breed was taken to levels that we have never achieved before. Many articles were written about Nicole and Fox Mulder in several magazines and they were also mentioned in some TV shows. In 2004 we also had the opportunity to hold a World Competition in Brazil sponsored by FCI. Nicole and Fox had prepared themselves since the beginning of the year, practicing everyday, and thinking only about 1<sup>st</sup> place. In July 2004, the team flew to Rio de Janeiro where they competed against the best animals of the breed and professional handlers. In front of an audience of about 5000 people, Nicole and Fox Mulder won the competition and became world champions. On our way back home, it was mentioned that Nicole was the youngest winning handler in the world. This record is in the Brazilian version of Guiness Book of Records.

In 2005 the plans were audacious, and the team was ready to try to be world champions for the second time, an unprecedented title. This time the world championship was held in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The conditions were not good for the team; it was very cold in Buenos Aires, about 0 degrees Celsius. The team is used to a much warmer climate. In Fortaleza the average temperature is 32 degrees Celsius. However Nicole and Fox Mulder represented the Brazilian breed very well, competing against animals from all over the world. The judge was Mr. Hans Muller, from Switzerland. He was the president of the FCI. And once again, Nicole and Fox Mulder won the competition.
